

West Bountiful Native Becomes an Author

Kathy Edmonds Atwood, a lonely little petunia raised on Onion Street in West Bountiful, is now the author of her first children's picture book. "Maybe It's A Zebra" was published in January 2012.

Atwood is the daughter of former West Bountiful residents Ray and Martha Edmonds. She is the sister of Gary Edmonds, former West Bountiful councilman. She attended West Bountiful Elementary School for six years back when it was a two story school house.

As a young girl she anticipated the excitement of the three day Kermis which was held each year in the fall...enjoying the events under the big tent, rock weighing, fish pond, and fortune telling with Kathy's mother dressed as a gypsy using tea leaves to tell one's fortune. She still has fond memories of bingo games, cake walks, hot dogs, and hamburgers.

"West Bountiful was a great place to be raised. I remember running through the fields, climbing trees, topping onions for Bishop Telford, and bunching onions and radishes for the Mano family when they lived on Pages Lane," said Atwood. In her youth she lived at 833 North 8th West. The white adobe house was torn down a few years ago and is now the entrance into a subdivision.

A grandmother of five, she loves to listen to the wonderful things that children say. She believes that children have a special insight and that we all have something to learn from each other, regardless of age. She has loved children's stories all of her life. Her children's book was inspired by a statement her grandson Steven made. Her late granddaughter Leelyn Atwood used her talents and imagination to create the artwork for several pages. Her memory, creativity, and spirit will live on through her pictures.

Every child has an active imagination says Atwood. This color picture book will help unlock children's imagination as they are asked simple, probing questions and given creative answers. The book is filled with animals that keep a child's attention, a learning activity to help a child learn about animals and a question and answer page to help with reading retention. Learning is rarely this fun!

Sometimes it is difficult to see the services that the City provides because they are literally under ground. We are only reminded of them when we get our utility bill! This Spring and Summer we will witness several projects that will greatly enhance our quality of life. Please read on as we introduce a new feature of our newsletter:



“Spotlight on Service”

After many years of working towards making needed improvements, we will see the following happen this construction season.

- 1) The waterline on 1100 West from 400 North up to 1200 North will be replaced. Over the last year we have had four significant leaks on that line and have patched over old patches. This will tie together two newer water lines on both end.
- 2) The waterline on 400 North from 800 West to 1100 West will be replaced. This is a continuation of the line that was started last year from the top end of 400 North in front of the school. This line is not only old but replacing it prepares us for the next project this year.
- 3) After the 400 North water line is replaced, the street itself will be replaced. This street has been in very poor condition. We are making sure that the utilities underground are repaired before we will replace the street, curb and gutter, and sidewalks. This will finally allow our school children to safely walk to school. This is a most significant and long desired project. It is also federally funded at the cost of about \$2,000,000. The City's portion is about \$165,000.
- 4) We are commencing the construction of our new Well to assure that we have a second source of water to provide for and protect our community. Once completed, Holly will contribute \$500,000 to help defray the costs.
- 5) A new trail will be constructed along the DSB canal from 800 West to the Legacy Parkway Trail. It will be our first east/west trail and has been designated an equestrian trail from the beginning of its design. Working with the State we received a 50% match to help pay for it. The other 50% is coming from park impact fees. The total value of the trail is about \$200,000.
- 6) In our main Park, we will complete the rebuild of the third ball field. We are excited to now have safe and workable new ball fields. These projects are funded by RAP taxes which come as a part of the sales taxes largely contributed from outside our community.
- 7) Also in our main Park Bowery the Stage is being updated. It will be extended to accommodate more performers, and it will be lowered to make it compliant with safety codes.

All told these improvements are valued at about \$4,000,000. We have long prepared and sacrificed to be able to begin making these greatly needed improvements for our community.

We seek your patience as these projects progress. There will be some necessary inconvenience as we work under and on the roads. We will communicate via the marquee and by flyer to immediately affected areas. Please plan on alternative routes as the work on 1100 West and 400 North commences.

Lakeside Golf... A New Beginning

The Lakeside Golf Course is in the process of undergoing a transformation in leadership with an intense focus on Customer Service and improving the Course over the next several years.

Kelly Class is now the Head Golf Professional. Kelly is known for his customer service and long time caring for the course. Kelly is ably assisted by John Broberg. They have championed an upgrade to the Point-of-Sale system which will now allow much greater flexibility in tracking customer accounts including, passes, credit book, and pre-paid gift certificates.



The Course has a new fee schedule that was adopted by the City Council. Highlighted changes include the Range, establishing the age for "Seniors" at 55 years old, retaining the resident discount of 30% through punch passes only.



Marcus Fenton is now the Course Superintendent. Marcus was the superintendent for Eaglewood for yearly two decades and is responsible for many of their improvements.

Change in Large Animal Ordinance

The City Council recently made a change to the large animal ordinance for West Bountiful City. The current ordinance relies upon a point system to determine the number of animals per acre. The new changes start with the

old point system, but allow for a condition use that would reduce the points for horses and other large animals from 40 to 25. This allows two large farm animals on a half acre lot and up to four on an acre.

The Conditional Use permit is obtained through the Planning and Zoning Commission. The City Council is waiving the \$20 permit fee for the first 12 months, effective immediately so that the permit is free of charge. It was felt that this change allows for many who have not been in compliance with the current ordinance to have an avenue to come into compliance. It is also a way to balance the needs and rights of property owners who have horses with their neighbors who do not.

West Bountiful Spring Construction Update 1100 West Water Line

Waterline construction began on February 27, 2012. Work will begin at 1200 North and proceed south. There will be intermittent road closures immediately around the area of work to protect the safety of the public and the workers both. The road will be re-opened each evening at the close of daily work. The City does not anticipate any work to occur on Fridays or weekends.

Everyone along this street should make some provisions for emergency water shut offs. Should the contractor unexpectedly break an existing line, the water would be turned off without notice. Otherwise, each home should receive a notice the day before a scheduled water shut down if their home is expected to be affected. This project will take six to eight weeks to complete.





BE PREPARED

The **2012 Great Utah ShakeOut on April 17, 2012**, is less than two months away! More than 400,000 people are already registered to participate. You can get daily updates about who is participating by following us on Twitter [@UtahShakeOut](https://twitter.com/UtahShakeOut). Also, find out exactly what a magnitude 7 earthquake would look like in Utah with the video [Utah: Preparedness Now](#) on YouTube.

Basic Instructions for your Drill

Some ShakeOut drills may last all day, while most are just a few minutes. Here is how to have a **basic** Drop, Cover, and Hold On drill, and what to do after (ShakeOut [drill manuals](#) provide detailed instructions for simple to complex drills):

- If you have **downloaded** the drill broadcast, begin playing it at 10:15
- At 10:15, practice Drop, Cover, and Hold On for at least 60 seconds (the length of the drill broadcast):
 - **DROP** to the ground (before the earthquake drops you!)
 - Take **COVER** by getting under a sturdy desk or table (or against a wall with your arms covering your head/neck), and
 - **HOLD ON** to your shelter until the shaking stops.
- Then, importantly, talk with people you are with about what might happen in a real earthquake, what you learned by practicing, and how you can reduce the risk of injury (at home, work, or school) by [securing your space](#).
- Share [photos, stories, or videos](#), and tweet about your drill (use #UtahShakeOut).
